From The Principal

Then, I think we run the risk of sleeping through, not hearing the call at all and missing our opportunity to live the life that we are meant for. It may not always be as comfortable, but we can't live our life under the covers.

As we enter into this Advent, I want to use this time to listen for the alarm that God sends to me. Hopefully, I can throw off the covers and seize the day, both literally and figuratively. As well, I hope that this season provides you with an opportunity to reflect on the blessings that you and your family have, and the ways in which you may be called to wakefulness.

School Plan 2024-25

One of the tasks of the school administration is to develop a plan in consultation with the various members of the community, including staff, students and parents. Many of the initiatives pursued by schools require a long-term approach for implementation. As a result, most school plans encompass more than one school year. This practice has been the case in our school; these goals will continue forward into subsequent school years.

Goal 1-Numeracy Education

Numeracy Education: To deepen students' understanding of numerical concepts.

- This was a priority area last year. Although some progress was made, we wanted to consolidate the gains made and further the work in this area.
- We have a good understanding of the areas of strength as well as challenge in our students undstanding math concepts at all grade levels.
- Teachers will meet in grade bands to share challenges and strengths in numeracy instruction, as well as to increase consistency in curriculum implementation across the grade levels.
- Teachers will attend professional development in this area, both on MTS PD Day and during the year as opportunities arise.
- Teachers will implement best practice in numeracy education, as determined through research.

Goal 2- Strategic Priorities

- Strategic Priorities: To address the priorities outlined in the school's strategic plan.
- Staff will regularly review the school's strategic plan to evaluate progress towards its goals.
- Sub-committees, with members of the staff and the board, will be struck to advance priority areas selected as foci for this year.

Ongoing Priorities

The Staff will continue to work on our most recent priority areas including **Supporting Student Mental Health, Technology, Sustainability** and **Indigenous Education.**

Although these are not officially on our plan, we want to capitalize on the gains made in these areas and use this momentum to continue work in these areas.

Music Term 1 2024-2025

Hello everyone, Miss Millet here! I'm delighted to be back for another year of fun in the music classroom at St. Als! I can't believe we're wrapping up Term 1 already, so here is a quick recap of life in the music room:

September:

During the start of the new school year, we made sure in every class to establish that music is for everyone in our community, both familiar and new. In the spirit of reconciliation, all classes explored the various kinds of singing, instrumentation, and dance throughout Turtle Island. Throughout the month we also reviewed musical fundamentals such as beat, rhythm, tempo, and reading the music staff to set our foundation for the rest of the year.

October:

October was an exciting month for our Grade 3-6s, as we were introduced to several new instruments! Grade 3s learned how to listen to each other during Orff instrument ensembles, Grade 4s learned how to be responsible with their recorders, Grade 5 jammed on ukulele, and Grade 6 picked up guitar once again! I thank our younger grades for singing "Pass the Pumpkin" and "Pumpkin, Pumpkin" nice and loud throughout this month while bearing with my spooky, croaky voice!

November:

Peace was again a reoccurring theme of November, and we worked on developing a beautiful singing voice with songs like "Peace Before Us, Peace Behind Us", and "Peace is Flowing like a River". Physical Education Across the Grados

<u>Grades</u>

Kindergarten—Grade 2

This term the early years students were involved in activities to practice and develop some of the fourteen basic movement skills. In particular, we worked on galloping, running and skipping. As well, we learned to use different equipment and played a variety of cooperative and low organized games. We discussed and practiced the rules and routines we use to play safely and fairly in the gym.

Grades 3-5

During the first term the grade three to five students were involved in the following activities: various sport lead up games, fitness challenges and low organized games. The skills we have focused on developing this term include manipulation skills: passing throwing and catching. We have also worked on the movement skills of running and moving in the gym through our various games and activities. We have also worked on fair play concepts and what that looks like in the gym.

Grade 6-8

Students in grades six—eight were involved in the following activities: volleyball, fitness challenges and low organized games. We have focused on developing manipulation skills such as overhead and underhand passing and serving. Our fitness challenges have helped the students to identify some goals to work on during the year to improve their overall fitness.





From the Gym

The fall has been a very busy time in the gym. All the classes are settled into our routines and are enjoying being physically active.

The primary classes have been working on moving safely in the gym. We have been playing cooperative games and are developing a sense of fair play. We are learning to use a variety of equipment and have been concentrating on throwing and catching activities. Our elementary friends have been playing volleyball lead-up games, participating in fitness challenges and enjoying a variety of low organized games. Our older students have been playing volleyball, working to assess and improve their fitness level and participating in different games and activities.

Our annual Terry Fox Family Walk was held on Thursday, September 12th. It was a great day and everyone enjoyed the pizza after the walk was finished. Thank you to everyone who participated and a special thanks to those who donated to this worthy cause.

Volleyball season just finished up. We had four teams on the go (two boys teams and two girls teams) with more than 50 student athletes involved. French

Bonjour à tous!

Throughout the first term, each class has been actively participating in various language based activities & games such as, Lotto, Bazinga, Buzz, Q & A's, Brain Teasers, all which have been connected to curricular outcomes within our thematic units.

My goal in French is to help students develop their knowledge of French vocabulary, increase positive attitudes, & my main focus on enhancing communication skills. In turn, students will become better writers in French; 'if they can say it, then they can write it'.



I am thrilled by the overall participation and enthusiasm each class exhibits and look forward to starting a new and exciting next term!

1ier année- The grade one class is a lively group, eager to learn and participate during French lessons. Each class begins with our routine greeting, "Bonjour, comment ça va?", followed by chants of the days of the week, months of the year, and movement breaks that include counting from 1 to 10 in French. During our theme on colors, students read the book *Les feuilles* and enjoyed literacy games and activities like 4 Corners, Lotto and memory, which helped reinforce repetition and comprehension. Great start to the year!

2ieme année- In French class, the grade two students are attentive learners, carefully following explanations and using visual cues to aid their comprehension. Each class includes a mix of songs, games, and language-focused activities to support their language growth. During our unit on family, the class worked on recognizing and correctly naming different family members (la maman, le papa, la sœur, le frère, le bébé, la grand-mère, and le grand-père). Their family portraits are already beginning to reflect their grasp of the vocabulary learned in class. Students are currently practicing reading and identifying colors in French through our class read-aloud, "Pat le Chat; J'adore mes souliers blancs". They are also working on creating their own versions of the story. Well done, grade two!

3ieme année- The grade 3 class started the term by reviewing calendar vocabulary, including the days of the week, months of the year, and seasons. Students engaged in various literacy activities related to our weather theme to strengthen their vocabulary and comprehension. By the end of the unit, they were able to describe different types of weather in each season. Currently, the class is enjoying our book study, "Les Animaux du Zoo", where they are practicing at recognizing, identifying, and labeling different animals and their associated colors.

4ieme année- The grade 4 class is an enthusiastic group with a strong interest in learning French. They particularly enjoy participating in "Mini prof," where each student takes a turn leading the class through our calendar Q&A routine in French. Recently, they have been actively learning new vocabulary related to our unit *L'École*. They demonstrated their ability to name and identify objects by creating "Sac à Dos" mini posters, and further showcased their knowledge by independently writing descriptive sentences about where these items are located within a school setting. Fantastic start—keep up the great work!

Sieme année- Throughout the first term, the grade 5 class has been practicing calendar skills, recognizing written numbers in French, and using the phrasing "Aujourd'hui, Hier était, Demain sera" to describe the date. We began the year by focusing on dictionary skills to enhance spelling, reading comprehension, and writing independence. The class has also concentrated on identifying and using French prepositions in their writing tasks. Currently, students are working at applying their understanding of prepositions and vocabulary related to *La Maison* to

create complete sentences describing their magazine art. Excellent work this term!

Gieme année- In French, the grade 6 class begins each session with *Message du jour*, an essential part of balanced literacy that engages students in thematic study and reinforces correct French spelling, phrasing, and reading. Students demonstrated their understanding and use of phrases like "j'aime, j'adore, je n'aime pas, & je déteste" through their sentence structures connected to their jigsaw puzzle art. Currently, they are expanding their skills by incorporating these phrases into their *Jouer vs Faire* Prezi project.

7ieme année- This term, the grade 7 class focused on the introduction of regular "er" verbs and mastering their correct conjugation forms. Students demonstrated their understanding of "-er" conjugations by completing a Halloween-themed art activity. In our next unit on articles of clothing, the class will concentrate on reading, decoding, and comprehending the text *Habiller Dans* le Noir. They will work on sequencing the story in French, filling in missing vocabulary, and editing the text with proper "er" verb conjugations. To conclude the unit, students will showcase their comprehension by creating their own version of the story. Bonne chance!

8ieme année- The grade eight class has demonstrated progress in using vocabulary and phrases modeled by the teacher and following simple instructions in French. Students have successfully applied learned vocabulary in their writing and during peer interactions in our Q&A sessions. In our unit on "er" verb conjugations, students engaged with a text through repeated reading to improve comprehension and fluency. They practiced sequencing the story, filling in missing infor-



mation, and editing it for correct use of "-er" conjugations. Currently, students are showcasing their understanding of vocabulary and sentence structure by creating their own versions of the "Frankenstein" story to align with their artwork. A fantastic start to the year!

PALS



School Board News



Financial Report for the year ended June 30, 2024

For 2023/2024 enrollment stayed stable from 2022/2023 levels.

Academic revenue increased to inflationary increases in government grants, tuition increases, and new one-time funding received for Shared Services.

Other revenue increased primarily due to higher interest income.

Expenses increased primarily due to higher staffing costs combined with increased spending on clinical services and shops supplies and student activities.

In 2023/2024 \$232,000 was spent on the new play structure, paving, a new intercom system and computers.
